Dr John Lake

An appreciation by Vic Rees

Dr Lake, who passed away in early September, provided the inspiration for the croquet club, and it is a sad irony that his death should have occurred at the conclusion of the club's residence within the park. He joined the National Institute of Agricultural Engineering, later to become the Silsoe Research Institute, around 1960, and shortly afterwards presented the Sports and Social Committee with a croquet set, thus igniting the interest in the game which persists to this day. The set arrived in a large pinewood box containing six wire hoops, four boxwood balls, four mallets with boxwood heads and a set of clips, and in 1961 it was bought by the newly-constituted Wrest Park Croquet Club for the sum of £7/10 (a copy of the receipt appeared in the February 2011 newsletter).

The first croquet lawn was marked out on one of the lawns immediately south of the Mansion under the guidance of Major Bromley-Fox, who was listed on the Social noticeboard as Umpire and Coach. He organised croquet lessons in the lunch hour with the aid of a postage stamp sized book of laws which he would consult frequently and make pronouncements on tactics, stroke play and the etiquette of the game. In a matter of weeks some of his pupils had improved so much that he was easily beaten.

During the winter of 1961-2 the wire hoops were replaced with four sets of tournament hoops made by club members at a cost of $\pounds 4/6/1$. In 1963 the club constitution was approved and the NIAE granted

permission for the creation of four lawns on the current site, and the following year Wrest Park won the Longman Cup, beating Parsons Green 3-2 at Hurlingham.

Club members in the early days included Sue Abrahams (later Mrs Matthews), George Carpenter, Joe Clark, Anto Davies, Major Bromley-Fox, Harry Green, Paddy Groak, Tom Marchant, Len Mousley, Vic Rees and Miss Eira Vanstone. Joe, Anto, Tom and Vic made up the victorious 1964 Longman Cup team.

Dr Lake was at one time Chairman of the Sports and Social Committee. He never played croquet himself, but his initial contribution was the key factor in the establishment of the club.
